KIN 101 satisfies the CORE requirement for the AA-T in Kinesiology for Transfer

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

This course involves the theory and detailed demonstration of the first aid care of the injured. The student will learn to assess a victim's condition and incorporate proper treatment. Standard first aid, CPR, and AED certification(s) will be granted upon successful completion of requirements.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Assess victims of injury and medical emergencies and apply emergency action plan
- 2. Describe the signs and symptoms associated with common medical emergencies Demonstrate the first aid care that is needed in common medical emergencies
- 3. Demonstrate cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of AED
- 4. Demonstrate bandaging and splinting techniques
- 5. Demonstrate emergency rescue moves
- 6. Evaluate their lifestyle for health and safety concerns and set personal goals for achieving a safe and healthy lifestyle

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Understand and apply basic first aid and safety principles.
- 2. Acquire the ability to recognize and identify signs and symptoms requiring first aid attention.
- 3. Apply CPR techniques and properly use an AED, as delineated by the American Heart Association.

- i. Poisoning: Swallowed/Injected.
