2. Public Commentary

Procedural: 2.1 Public to Address the Senate on Agenda Items

3. New Business

[Per AB 361](#): "This bill, until January 1, 2024, would authorize a local agency to use teleconferencing without complying with the teleconferencing requirements imposed by the Ralph M. Brown Act when a legislative body of a local agency holds a meeting during a declared state of emergency, as that term is defined, when state or local health officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, during a proclaimed state of emergency held for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and during a proclaimed state of emergency when the legislative body has determined that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, as provided."

According to the Bill, we must vote by majority to meet virtually due to the state of emergency.

Does the Senate vote yea or nay to the following:

Palo Verde College Academic Senate finds that the March 4, 2020, declaration of a State of Emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic by Governor Gavin Newsom remains active and that the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the Senate and members of the public to meet safely in person, therefore, the Senate authorizes the continuation of virtual meetings pursuant to Assembly Bill 361 for the next 30 days.
