

# CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION EMPLOYMENT OUTCOMES SURVEY

2022 College Report

# Palo Verde College

Completer and skills-building students at Palo Verde College were surveyed if they met one of the following criteria in 2019-2020, and did not enroll (or were minimally enrolled) in 2020-2021: earned a certificate of 6 or more units, earned a vocational degree, or earned 9+ CTE units (noncredit cohorts earned a noncredit vocational/CTE award or completed at least 48 CTE hours in that year). The survey was administered in 2022 by e-mail, text message (SMS), and telephone. The survey addressed student perceptions of their CTE program, employment outcomes, and how their coursework and training relate to their current career. A total of 526 students were surveyed and 33 (6%) students responded: 42% by email, 45% by phone, 3% by SMS Link, and 9% by 2-way SMS.

### **More Key Results**

**\$3.70** is the overall change in hourly wages after completing training—in dollars

**26%** is the overall change in hourly wages after completing training—in percentage gain

**81%** of respondents reported being employed for pay

**12%** of respondents reported transferring to another college or university

**90%** of respondents reported being very satisfied or satisfied with their training.

## Conclusion

The results of the survey showed that completing CTE studies and training – whether or not a credential is earned, whether or not a student transfers – is related to positive employment outcomes. The preponderance of respondents are employed and are working in the same field as their studies or training. Notably, students realize a greater wage gain after completing their studies if they secure a job that is similar to their program of study.
